TRADITION EIGHT

Alcoholics Anonymous will never have a professional class. We have gained some understanding of the ancient words "Freely ye have received, freely give." We have discovered that at the point of professionalism, money and spirituality do not mix. Almost no recovery from alcoholism has ever been brought about by the world's best professionals, whether medical or religious. We do not decry professionalism in other fields, but we accept the sober fact that it does not work for us. Every time we have tried to professionals our Twelfth Step, the result has been exactly the same: ***Our single purpose has been defeated.*** Alcoholics simply will not listen to a paid twelfth-stepper. Almost from the beginning, we have been positive that face-to-face work with the alcoholic who suffers could be based only on the desire to help and be helped. When an A.A. talks for money, whether at a meeting or to a single newcomer, it can have a very bad effect on him, too. The money motive compromises him and everything he says and does for his prospect. This has always been so obvious that only a few A.A.'s have ever worked the Twelfth Step for a fee. Despite this certainty, it is nevertheless true that few subjects have been the cause of more contention within our Fellowship than professionalism. Caretakers who swept floors, cooks who fried hamburgers, secretaries in offices, authors writing books—all these we have seen hotly assailed because they were, as their critics angrily remarked, "making money out of A.A." Ignoring the fact that these labors were not Twelfth Step jobs at all, the critics attacked as A.A. professionals these workers of ours who were often doing thankless tasks that no one else could or would do. Even greater furors were provoked when A.A. members began to run rest homes and farms for alcoholic, when some hired out to corporations as personnel men in charge of the alcoholic problem in industry, when some became nurses on alcoholic wards, when others entered the field of alcohol education. In all these instances, and more, it was claimed that A.A. knowledge and experience were being sold for money, hence these people, too, were professionals. At last, however, a plain line of cleavage could be seen between professionalism and non-professionalism. When we had agreed that the Twelfth Step couldn't be sold for money, we had been wise. But when we had declared that our Fellowship couldn't hire service workers nor could any A.A. member carry our knowledge into other fields, we were taking the counsel of fear, fear which today has been largely dispelled in the light of experience. Take the case of the club janitor and cook. If the club is going to function, it has to be habitable and hospitable. We tried volunteers, who were quickly disenchanted with sweeping floors and brewing coffee seven days a week. They just didn't show up. Even more important, an empty club couldn't answer its telephone, but it was an open invitation to a drunk on a binge who possessed a spare key. So somebody had to look after the place full time. If we hired an alcoholic, he'd receive only what we'd have to pay a non-alcoholic for the same job. The job was not to **do** Twelfth Step work; it was to make Twelfth Step work possible. It was a service proposition, pure and simple. Neither could A.A. itself function without full-time workers. At the Foundation (*General Service Office in New York*) and

THE MEETINGS

The meetings in A.A. provide a fine social outlet for the members and are a part of the valuable "group therapy" which A.A. brings to bear upon the alcoholic problem. However there is a more important purpose of the meetings—it is there that the members, both new and old, learn and retain the knowledge of and the necessity of practicing the twelve steps of the program. So oftentimes we find members who go to meetings regularly but only for the social side. They pay little attention to the talks and discussions—except to criticize—and the talks and the discussions themselves are left exactly where they found them—in the meeting hall. There is a story that has gone the rounds for many years where-ever there is public speaking. It tells of a gentleman who was hurrying to church on Sunday morning and evidently was very late for the service. As he neared the church he saw a large crowd of people leaving the edifice. Anxious to learn whether the services were over, he stopped a little old lady coming down the steps. "Is the sermon over?" he queried. "No," the lady replied, "the sermon is not over." "Well then, why are all these people leaving church if the sermon is not over?" "Because the minster has left the pulpit." "But I thought you said the sermon was not over: now you tell me the minister has left the pulpit. How is it possible for the minster to have left the pulpit before the sermon is over?" "The minster has indeed left the pulpit: but still the sermon is not over. For now it is really beginning. The people receive the value of the sermon only if and when they **ACT** on it in their daily lives!" This same truth can be applied to the A.A. meetings. The members who **ACT** on the talks and the discussions in their daily lives are the ones who get full value from the meetings. On the other hand they who take no such action get from the meetings exactly what they go to obtain; a social evening. As a result they learn little A.A.; they take home little A.A.; they practice little A.A.; and then the inevitable slip and once again we hear, "And to think John attended meetings so regularly!" There are many such in A.A. meetings—many who although attending meetings regularly take no **ACTION** on what they hear there and thus make no progress except backwards—for meetings without **ACTION** are sterile—**ACTION IS THE MAGIC WORD.**

Mike B. opened the July 9, 2022, TBAIC Zoom meeting with the Declaration of Unity. Attendees: Mike B., Sara R., Scott S., John O., Tom F., Tracy S., Jonathon C., Jason C., Rich R., Jasmine L., and John T. Mike B. presented the chair report. Mike B. said he recently received a pre-release contact form for a man due to be released from a correctional facility in Arkansas who was coming to the Land O'Lakes area. He said he asked Tom F. to communicate with the individual. Mike also mentioned the request from the Tampa US Probation Officer which he said would be discussed under New Business. He said he attended the recent district meeting and gave a synopsis of the meeting. He added that he and John O. (incoming chairperson) would be attending the treatment and corrections committees' workshops at the upcoming area quarterly meeting in Miami. Mike said minutes of the district meeting and agenda for the area quarterly meetings would be sent out with minutes of this meeting. Jasmine L. was a new attendee at the meeting. She indicated she was the committee rep for the Live and Let Live group, and she was interested in how the committee functioned. Jasmine said she had previously contacted John T. and he provided her a list of service opportunities which she said she would share with her home group members. John T. asked if there were any questions or comments regarding the June minutes. Nothing was mentioned. The minutes were approved. Scott S. presented the treasurer's report. The current Pink Can balance is \$7,202.22. Contributions for the month totaled \$201.57. Operating expenses totaled \$140.87 and literature purchases totaled \$3,373.19. Scott said most of the literature purchases were made to replenish the supply in the TBAIC cabinets at central office. The report was approved. INSTITUTION MEETINGS UPDATES Treatment facilities meetings: ACTS Amethyst – John T. said volunteers have committed to chair 13 live and 1 Zoom meeting. He said the chairperson for one meeting changed but no other changes. ACTS Detox – John T. said chairpersons are still needed for noon time meetings on Monday, Tuesday, and some Saturdays. He said someone volunteered to chair the noon time meetings on the 3rd Saturday of each month but a volunteer is still needed for the other Saturdays. ACTS Sandra Prince Intermediate Care Program – John T. said volunteers are needed to chair meetings at both the 17th St and 131st Ave facilities. Cove Behavioral Health (formerly DACCO). Both men's and women's meetings have restarted. John said a new volunteer (John N.) is chairing the men's meeting and volunteers are needed for that meeting. HCA Florida West Tampa Hospital Detox (formerly Tampa Community Hospital or Town and Country Hospital). Tom F. said Jason C. started meetings at the facility and Tom said he would be starting to attend meetings there. Selah House. John T. said Liz S. picked up literature for the facility and indicated that if females are interested in volunteering to chair/attend meetings to contact her. The facility is a safe house for victims of human trafficking. River Oaks. Jason C. said Monday, Wednesday and Friday meetings are going well. Corrections facilities meetings: Falkenburg Road Women's Jail – Sara R. said jail management has begun to emphasize the need for all court ordered inmates to attend meetings. As a result, volunteer inmate attendees would be limited. Sara said a recent Sunday meeting had 15 court ordered and 7 inmate volunteer attendees. Sara said she discussed the possibility of adding a second meeting but none of the AA volunteers seem interested in doing that. Sara also said she was told that they could no longer bring AA literature such as Big Books and Grapevine magazines into meetings. She said she had a case of hard copy Big Books which she could either keep for future use or return to the TBAIC literature cabinet. Several committee members indicated that Sara should hold onto the books in the event the jail changes their policy. Falkenburg Road Men's Jail – Rich R. said the Sunday morning meeting was switched to Friday 2pm. He said there would no longer be a Sunday morning meeting. He added that the jail emphasis on having court ordered attendees going to meetings increased meeting attendance. He said he and 2 other volunteers are handling the meetings. He said he has been bringing AA literature to meetings with no objections by jail management. Zephyrhills CI –Tom F. stated all is going well. He said 18 inmates attended the last meeting. He said the meeting was granted permission to make and serve coffee at meetings and he believed that helped to increase attendance. He said a long-time inmate attendee has asked him if it would be possible to get the Daily Reflections daily reading sent to

him and others through the prison email system. Tom said he was working on that. True Core Behavioral. Jason C. said he will meet with facility management this Thursday and anticipates that meetings will be starting in the next few weeks. He said 3 female and 3 male volunteers have been cleared to attend meeting but that additional female volunteers are welcome. Tom F. said he may consider posting a notice on the Tampa AA Facebook group for volunteers. Jason said he would look into that. Bridging the Gap – Tracy S. said she got 1 call in June which she asked John T. to handle. John said the call back number was at ACTS Detox and when he called back no one there knew of the individual who called. Tracy said she received 4 messages via Ring Central so far this month. She said she called back 2 individuals and left messages with no call back and the other 2 were calls from institutions which were called back and could not determine who made the call. Mike B. said he received a call from an individual in Pinellas County who asked him to go visit a patient at a facility in Lutz. Mike said he tried to explain to the individual that he would need to contact someone else to do so. However, the individual became agitated and hung up the phone and could not be re-contacted. John O. asked to be added to the call list and Mike said he would do that. Tracy said she had a sponsee who would like to be added to the list and said she would provide her information to Mike. Man on the Bed – Tom F. said 2 calls from Tampa General. He said when the individuals were contacted by AA volunteers, they both said they did not want any help from AA. OLD BUSINESS: Mike B. said he will delay making an offer to other districts to provide them literature given the current Pink Can balance and recent spending for literature. Mike also said volunteers are always needed as noted above. NEW BUSINESS: US Probation Officer request for AA meeting at Tampa residential facility. Mike mentioned the email he received. Several members spoke in favor of doing the meetings, but further details are needed. John T. volunteered to contact the email sender and provide details to committee members. Scott S. went over the list of AA pamphlets he had purchased in the past and asked if there were any others that should be added to the supply in the TBAIC cabinets at the central office. Several additional pamphlets were mentioned, and Scott agreed to purchase those. Jonathon C. mentioned an incident he recently had with management at ACTS Detox. He said he and 5 other volunteers entered the facility. He said an unknown individual who identified herself as a manager indicated that only 2 volunteers at a time were allowed in the facility. Jonathon asked if anyone had experienced anything like that. John T. said that several months back, the program director at ACTS Amethyst had asked that no more the 2 outside AA volunteers attend meetings due to space limitations and social distancing requirements related to Covid-19. John said the former meeting coordinator for ACTS Detox expressed a similar concern. Jonathon said he was not aware of that requirement but said he would follow it in the future. Meeting adjourned with the Responsibility Statement and the Lord's Prayer. The next TBAIC meeting will be Saturday, August 13th, at 9:30 AM via Zoom.

intergroup offices, we couldn't employ non-alcoholics as secretaries; we had to have people who knew the A.A. pitch. But the minute we hired them, the ultraconservative and fearful ones shrilled, "Professionalism!" At one period, the status of these faithful servants was almost unbearable. They weren't asked to speak at A.A. meetings because they were "making money out of A.A." At times, they were actually shunned by fellow members. Even the charitably disposed described them as "a necessary evil." Committees took full advantage of this attitude to depress their salaries. They could regain some measure of virtue, it was thought, if they worked for A.A. real cheap. These notions persisted for years. Then we saw that if a hardworking secretary answered the phone dozens of times a day, listened to twenty wailing wives, arranged hospitalization and got sponsorship for ten newcomers, and was gently diplomatic with the irate drunk who complained about the job she was doing and how she was overpaid, then such a person could surely not be called a professional A.A. She was not professionalizing the Twelfth Step; she was just making it possible. Perhaps the fear will always lurk in every A.A. heart that one day our name will be exploited by somebody for real cash. Even the suggestion of such a thing never fails to whip up a hurricane, and we have discovered that hurricanes have a way of mauling with equal severity both the just and the unjust. They are always unreasonable.

**THE TWELVE TRADITIONS
TRADITION EIGHT**

Spiritual as it is, A.A. remains very much of this world. The Eight Tradition, like the Seventh Tradition, focuses on a vulgar five-letter word that isn't actually mentioned in either: *money*. Many of us have had to explain to some cynical prospect, "No, I'm not a social worker. I don't get paid for talking with you. I'm doing it because it's the best way to stay sober for myself." This does not mean, of course, that the idea of turning professional has never entered any A.A.'s mind. In the lean years, Bill W. did think of becoming a lay therapist to earn money through his experience in helping alcoholics. But, with a strong nudge from the group conscience, he soon realized that he could never hang out a shingle reading "Bill W., AA Therapist, \$10.00 an Hour"! It became clear to the early members that no A.A. should ever ask or accept payment for "carrying this message to somebody else, person to person, face to face. But new questions arose as membership grew and the word of hope spread, sending thousands of alcoholics in search of A.A. The first intergroups or central offices *were* usually manned by A.A. volunteers; now, most such offices are so busy that full-time employees are needed as well. Naturally, A.A.'s are better suited to such jobs than are non-members—but are these A.A.'s being paid for doing Twelfth Step work? NO. In the office, they are just paving the way for this work. Arranging to get a sick drunk into a hospital, telling a shaky newcomer where the nearest meeting is tonight, they are helping to make it possible for that alcoholic to hear the message "person to person and face to face".

STEPS EIGHT & NINE

Now we need more action, without which we find that "Faith without works is dead." Let's look at *Steps Eight and Nine*. We have a list of all persons we have harmed and to whom we are willing to make amends. We made it when we took inventory. We subjected ourselves to a drastic self-appraisal. Now we go out to our fellows and repair the damage done in the past. We attempt to sweep away the debris which has accumulated out of our effort to live on self-will and run the show ourselves. If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes. Remember it was agreed at the beginning *we would go to any lengths for victory over alcohol*. Probably there are still some misgivings. As we look over the list of business acquaintances and friends we have hurt, we may feel diffident about going to some of them on a spiritual basis. Let us be reassured. To some people we need not, and probably should not emphasize the spiritual feature on our first approach. We might prejudice them. At the moment we are trying to put our lives in order. But this is not an end in itself. Our real purpose is to fit ourselves to be of maximum service to God and the people about us. It is seldom wise to approach an individual, who still smarts from our injustice to him, and announce that we have gone religious. In the prize ring, this would be called leading with the chin. Why lay ourselves open to being branded fanatics or religious bores? We may kill a future opportunity to carry a beneficial message. But our man is sure to be impressed with a sincere desire to set right the wrong. He is going to be more interested in a demonstration of good will than in our talk of spiritual discoveries. We don't use this as an excuse for shying away from the subject of God. When it will serve any good purpose, we are willing to announce our convictions with tact and common sense. The question of how to approach the man we hated will arise. It may be he has done us more harm than we have done him and, though we may have acquired a better attitude toward him, we are still not too keen about admitting our faults. Nevertheless, with a person we dislike, we take the bit in our teeth. It is harder to go to an enemy than to a friend, but we find it much more beneficial to us. We go to him in a helpful and forgiving spirit, confessing our former ill feeling and expressing our regret. Under no condition do we criticize such a person or argue. Simply we tell him that we will never get over drinking until we have done our utmost to straighten out the past. We are there to sweep off our side of the street, realizing that nothing worth while can be accomplished until we do so, never trying to tell him what he should do. His faults are not discussed. We stick to our own. If our manner is calm, frank, and open, we will be gratified with the result.

© Today in JuLY of 2022 COVID has changed the way many groups contribute to the Central Office. Some groups have remained steady in their contributions, some groups have gone to ZOOM, A few ZOOM groups have made some contributions and some groups are Hybrid (in-person & ZOOM), other groups have folded for a lack of a space to have their meeting and some new groups are starting up, and now many groups are getting back to normal pre-pandemic live meetings. Things are looking up and getting better. It's certainly a time to renew our efforts and practice the meaning of the Serenity Prayer a little bit more. We currently have 198 Groups in the Hillsborough-East Pasco area with around 520 meetings weekly. Also we have 38 Zoom Groups with 113 meetings weekly (If I counted correctly). Contributions in July totaled \$ 10,205.44. This accounts for what 50 Groups or Individuals in our area have contributed in July, also included is \$860.04 from 10 Groups or Individuals who made contributions through PayPal. Included, also, \$ 72.00 from 2 members for the Birthday Club. Our literature sales for July was \$ 10,102.51. This includes sales from A.A. material and non-A.A. material (medallions—etc.) Our total income for July was \$ 20,327.08. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$ 7443.35. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our July income left us with a Gross Profit of \$ 12,883.72. Our Total Expenses for July were \$ 8940.51. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus+\$ 3,943.22 for the month of July. We still have a good Prudent Reserve, all our bills keep getting paid, the lights are on, we have a decent amount of literature available, the phones are working and it looks like 2022 just might be a better year to look forward to.
