STEP SEVEN

Step Seven is not difficult to understand; it is simply a prayer as outlined in the text of *Alcoholics Anonymous*. If we are ready to ask our Higher Power to remove all our defects of character, we are ready to approach our Higher Power about our defects of character through prayer. Steep Seven reads that we **humbly** approach our Higher Power. There are different definitions for humble. Let's use the *Merriam-Webster Dictionary's* definition of "Not proud or haughty." humility is defined as "Freedom from pride or arrogance: the quality or state of being humble." We approach God knowing that we are not in a position to make any demands. Humility will allow us to approach our Higher Power as our true selves.

Step Seven is our petition/prayer to ask our Higher Power to remove all our defects of character. We can find the Seventh Step prayer in the *Alcoholics Anonymous* text on page 76. It reads: **"My Creator, I am now willing that You should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that You now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to You and my fellows. Grant me the strength, as I go out from here, to do Your bidding. Amen."** We have completed Step Seven if we have petitioned God in such a manner. We have come to know true humility, and we will be able to put this humility to practice in the remaining Steps. Excerpt from *The Little Purple Pamphlet*.

We Keep What We Have By Giving It Away.

The alcoholic, drinking, tried his best to GRAB everything he could get his hands on—"free for nothing"! And always ended up with NOTHING but empty purse, empty stomach, and empty head. And that made room for the "Brooklyn boys!" In A.A. we are first GIVEN sobriety. And then we are advised that WE WILL KEEP AND ENLARGE UPON IT IN DIRECT RATIO AS WE GIVE IT AWAY. So, "having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics...." And so in all of our living, the MORE WE GIVE, the MORE WE'LL GET—for ALL gifts are given to us so that we may in turn give and share them with our fellow man. A.A., we learned, is a GIVE program; and life too, we learned, to be happy MUST also be a "GIVE" program. From *The Golden Book of Principles* by Father John Doe

THE ROCKS OF AA

All members of Alcoholics Anonymous who are honest with themselves are sober. Some are reluctantly sober. Others are passively sober. Some are happily sober. Others are joyously sober. Why is there a difference? It's the quality of their sobriety. Sober is sober, you may say. If a guy or the gal isn't drinking then he's sober. If he or she is drinking then he or she isn't sober. That's all there is to it. But that isn't all there is to it. A ride on the water wagon will bring sobriety, at least for the duration of the ride. But it's likely to be a pretty low grade of sobriety. It's a reluctant sobriety, the I-don't-like-this-but-I've-got-to kind. The rider is so sorry for himself he won't even talk to the driver. He might just as well be going through a tunnel for all the passing scene means to him. Some members of AA are like that. Then there's the passive sobriety. This alcoholic has reached the bottom below which he doesn't want to go, so he joins AA. He comes to meetings, listens a bit, talks a bit, puts enough of the principles to work to keep himself sober, takes only a passive interest in the group, seldom has time for Twelfth Step work, absorbs as much as he needs and gives only what is brushed from him through contact. He's sober, yes. But he isn't the kind of member that has made AA grow, that has enabled AA to reach out to the thousands of hopeless drunks and restore them to sanity. He isn't particularly happy or unhappy. He's rather numb about the whole thing. Fortunately, there aren't too many members like him. Then there's the happy type of sobriety. This fellow accepts his defeat that he and liquor don't get along—and takes hold of AA with enthusiasm. He seems to grasp the program quickly and shows that he's putting it to work. He enters into group affairs and carries his share or more than his share of the load. He attend meetings. He does Twelfth Step work as it comes and hunts for more. He tends to be a little evangelistic at the start, later cools off as he gains experience and becomes a solid member of the group. He's pretty happy about the whole thing. He's changes his pattern of life and his associations. And while occasionally he may long momentarily for the good old days when liquor was fun—before it became a problem to him—he doesn't brood about it and he's fairly well satisfied with his lot. Many members stay in this class throughout their association with the fellowship. But a great many more stay in this group only for awhile, then slip almost unnoticed into another classification. This last is the group which enjoys a joyous sobriety. Those who are blessed with joyous sobriety can't be separated physically from the happily sober ones. No halo hangs over their heads. No particular gleam sparkles from their eyes. Theirs is an inward joyousness that stems from gratitude to a gracious God. These joyous AA's are humble folk who know that humility consists not in groveling but in having a true perspective of their spiritual assets and liabilities. These are the members to whom others refer as having achieved serenity, although they'd be the first to deny it. Their lives aren't serene, but they have achieved the ability to take things as they come, to roll with the punches, to change those things they can and to ask the God of their understanding for guidance and counsel in all things. These are the folks who started doing for others because

TBAIC JULY SECRETARY REPORT

Chair Report - The meeting started at 9:30 AM with the Declaration of Unity. Jonathan’s report consisted of him sharing information about seeing pink cans at a number of meetings he attended and he shared on the work of our committee and thanked the groups for their support. He also said he would attend a Founders Day event at the 3333 Club being put on by FCYPAA on June 8 between the hours of 12 to 4 PM. **Secretary Report** - Tom F. then read the secretary report and it was accepted as read without any changes to it. **Treasurer Report** – John T’s. presented the Treasurer's Report. Our current balance is \$4,992.01. Monthly expenses were \$50.00 for Central Office Storage, \$25.80 uncashed check to Sara R. which reduced the monthly expense to \$24.20. Literature expenses for the month totaled \$2,920.77. Our committee received \$509.80 in contributions from the following groups: Grapevine Gals; Keep It Simple Pass It On; Language of the Heart and Ruskin Fellowship (Sunday). **Treatment** – All meetings at ACTS Detox are being covered except for the Friday noon meeting needs some help as the person currently covering cannot do it every week. All meetings at ACTS Amethyst are currently being covered except Wednesday at 1:00 PM. Cove Housing for Women seems to have closed their doors to us and we are not sure why that happened. The men’s meetings at Cove Behavioral Heath are going well. According to Joe R.. Sandra Prince is also doing well according to Joe R.. **Corrections** – True Core Juvenile, had a girl commit suicide and the state has taken the facility offline. She asked about getting the literature back from the facility. She was told to get any literature back that she could. Hillsborough County Jail for women Bianca reported that a couple of volunteers were rotating out for personal reasons, but she has 4 new volunteers in the process of getting cleared for the Hillsborough County Jail. No report for the men’s side of Hillsborough Jail. Things are going well at Zephyrhills CI according to Tom F. Jessica reported that they are having issues covering meetings at the Pasco County Jail for women. She also expressed some interest in possibly replacing Brittani as the coordinator for that facility. **Bridge The Gap** – Bridge the Gap we two Bridges. Man on the Bed – Tom F. reported that he had one call for a male patient but the person who was supposed to cover it simply forgot to do it. **Old Business** – No old business **New Business** – Bay Care North wants us to take a meeting into a new facility with patients who were Baker Acted. they were told they should, that it was a part of the program. But as they grew spiritually they found that in direct proportion to the amount of good they did willingly and freely, with no thought of recompense, the good things in life both spiritually and materially were returned to them. Soon they needed no reason for doing good. They now just do it as a part of decent living. They live a day at a time, place themselves in the hands of a Higher Power each morning to carry out His will for that day, ask daily to be so filled with His grace that it can be passed on to others. In doing these things they don't think of themselves as anything special. They do only what they think in their hearts they should. We all know them. While they give no outward indication they stand out everywhere. They're the rocks with which the temple of AA has slowly risen. We can all be like them if only we will put forth the effort. It's up to us.

Our growth continuing, the combined income of Alcoholics Anonymous members will soon reach the astounding total of a quarter of a billion dollars yearly. This is the direct result of AA membership. Sober we now have it; drunk we would not. By contrast, our overall AA expenses are trifling. For instance, the AA General Service Office now costs us \$1.50 per member a year. As a fact, the New York office asks the groups for this sum twice a year because not all of them contribute. Even so, the sum per member is exceedingly small. If an AA happens to live in a large metropolitan center where an intergroup office is absolutely essential to handle heavy inquiries and hospital arrangements, he contributes (or probably should contribute) about \$5.00 annually. To pay the rent of his own group meeting place, and maybe coffee and doughnuts, he might drop \$25.00 a year in the hat. Or if he belongs to a club, it could be \$50.00. In case he takes the AA Grapevine, he squanders an extra \$2.50! So the AA member who really meets his group responsibilities finds himself liable for about \$5.00 a month on the average. Yet his own personal income may be anywhere between \$200 and \$2,000 a month—the direct result of not drinking. “But,” some will contend, “our friends want to give us money to furnish that new clubhouse. We are a new small group. Most of us are still pretty broke. What then?” I am sure that myriads of AA voices would now answer the new group saying; “Yes, we know just how you feel. We once solicited money ourselves. We even solicited publicly. We thought we could do a lot of good with other peoples' money. But we found that kind of money too hot to handle. It aroused unbelievable controversy. It simply wasn't worth it. Besides, it set a precedent which has tempted many people to use the valuable name of Alcoholics Anonymous for other than AA purposes. While there may be little harm in a small friendly loan which your group really means to repay, we really beg you to think hard before you ask the most willing friend to make a large donation. You can, and you soon will, pay your own way. For each of you these overhead expenses will never amount to more than the price of one bottle of good whiskey a month. You will be everlastingly thankful if you pay this small obligation yourselves.” When reflecting on these things, why should not each of us tell himself: “Yes, we AAs were once a burden on everybody. We were 'takers.' Now that we are sober, and by the grace of God have become responsible citizens of the world, why shouldn't we now about-face and become 'thankful givers'! Yes, it is high time we did!”

Dr Bob's Story of the AA Camel

SELF-SUPPORT-June, 2024

© Today in June, 2024 COVID has changed the way many groups contribute to the Central Office. Some groups have remained steady in their contributions, some groups have gone to ZOOM, A few ZOOM groups have made some contributions and some groups are Hybrid (in-person & ZOOM), other groups have folded for a lack of a space to have their meeting and some new groups are starting up, and now many groups are getting back to normal pre-pandemic live meetings. Things are looking up and getting better. It's certainly a time to renew our efforts and practice the meaning of the Serenity Prayer a little bit more. We currently have 191 Groups in the Hillsborough-East Pasco area with around 502 meetings weekly. Also we have 128 Zoom meetings weekly Contributions in June totaled \$4,271.17. This accounts for what 18 Groups or Individuals in our area have contributed in June, also included is, \$1,553.32 from 10 Groups or Individuals who made contributions through PayPal and \$215.00 from 4 members of the Birthday Club. Our literature sales for June was \$6,952.09. This includes sales from A.A. material and non-A.A. material (medallions—etc.). Our total income for June was \$11,223.26. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$4,780.99. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our June income left us with a Gross Profit of \$6,442.27. Our Total Expenses for June were \$10,943.57. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus-\$4,501.30 for the month of June. June was another poor month sinking us further into the red for the year. We still have a good Prudent Reserve, all our bills keep getting paid, the lights are on, we have a decent amount of literature available, the phones are working Thank you for your support . Thank You!!! O.M. tws:)

These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. (The 12 Traditions were created to help each A.A. group maintain unity and relate better to the world about us. Below is a snapshot inventory you can take to see how well you are honoring the spiritual principle found in this Tradition.) **Tradition Seven:** Every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions. **1.** Honestly now, do I do all I can to help AA (my group, my central office, my GSO) remain self-supporting? Could I put a little more into the basket on behalf of the new person who can't afford it yet? How generous was I when drunk in a barroom? **2.** How do I (or my group) support our International Journals of Alcoholics Anonymous, Grapevine and La Viña? **3.** If GSO runs short of funds some year, wouldn't it be OK to let the government subsidize AA groups in hospitals and prisons? **4.** Is it more important for a group to get a big AA collection from a few people, or a smaller collection in which more members participate? **5.** Is a group treasurer's report unimportant AA business? How does the treasurer feel about it? **6.** Does my group have a "prudent reserve"? If yes, do I know what that amount is? **7.** If a family member, work colleague or close friend who is not an AA member wants to make a financial contribution to my group, should the group accept it? What if my group is short on funds?


