WILL WE SQUANDER OUR INHERITANCE ?

Bill W. wrote to Dr. Bob in 1949: "The groups will eventually take over, and maybe they will squander their inheritance when they get it. It is probable, however, that they won't. Anyhow, they really have grown up; AA is theirs; let's give it to them." As a sober member of AA for more than twenty-seven years, I see some disturbing differences between what I was taught in the beginning and what is happening now. What has happened to the pride we AA's have traditionally taken in saying, "I belong to the Guttersnipe Group"? To our feeling that each one of us takes part in the group's primary purpose—carrying the message? I see groups that regularly have thirty people at meetings, but only five active members. Who takes responsibility for the necessary jobs—group offices, sponsorship, coffee making? Is the AA group dying because of individual apathy? The Responsibility Declaration is basic to AA thinking: "I am responsible. When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there. And for that: I am responsible." Yet central offices seem to be having more and more difficulty finding sober alcoholics to make Twelfth Step calls. One of the first things I learned is that I need the newcomer as much as he needs me, yet some members feel they are doing new people a favor by getting in touch with them. Are we trying to hold on to sobriety now by *not* giving it away? I wonder how many are lost because we don't have the time—or won't make the time—to share or care. What about the still-suffering drunk who calls AA and is told where the meeting is—and to go by himself? What of the newcomer who goes to a meeting and finds no one to talk to? Or is told to call other members but is given no names or numbers? When I was called on by an AA member, I joined a group and got a sponsor. The group gave me a list of members, with addresses and phone numbers, to use when needed. Today, there seems to be little follow-up, little caring, few phone calls. How many alcoholics have we lost simply because they were never really accepted? Is Do sober members still say, "Hey, how are you doing? Call me if you get shook up, no matter what time it is. Remember, we need you"? Alcoholics may be getting sober, not because of us, but in spite of us. I have talked to many older members who feel as I do. Remember, AA is not going to preserve itself automatically. What are we, each one of us, doing with the gift of sobriety, so freely and lovingly given? Will we soon squander our magnificent inheritance? Perhaps each one of us should hold on to these thought: "Keep me mindful of the responsibilities that accompany the blessings of freedom. The only time that wrong can prevail is when good people do nothing."

**TBAIC SECRETARY REPORT
 May 10, 2025**

Attendees: Jessica M, John T, Mindy W, Patty G., Nancy H., Alberto A., Todd P., Ed S., Hezekiah D., and Michael P. Meeting began at 9:30am with the Serenity Prayer. **Chair Report:** Jessica said she gave a presentation about TBAIC activities at the last District meeting. She said Gaby would not be at the meeting since she was attending her graduation ceremony. **Secretary Report:** John read the secretary report for the month of April and it was accepted without any changes. **Treasurer Report:** John reports that the funds are in good standing. The current balance is \$3,328.38. There were contributions totaling \$1,344.96 last month from the following groups: Barricks Brigade, Great Way To Start The Day, High Nooners (Zephyrhills), Keep it Simple Pass it On, Keystone Discussion, Language of the Heart (3333), Living in the Solution, Nightly Newcomers (3333), On The Way Home, Ruskin Fellowship (Sunday), Steps By The Book and Women's Friendship. Expenses included \$75 for TBAIC storage space at Central Office and reimbursement of \$75.80 to Tom F. for Zephyrhills CI coffee expenses. Literature expenses totaled \$512.17. The report was accepted without any changes. John mentioned that the Treasurer's report and other TBAIC documents are posted at the TBAIC web site under Members Only tab. Mindy mentioned someone in her home group thought the wording in contribution thank you letters was misleading. John said he would discuss separately with Mindy and make changes to clarify the letter. **Treatment Centers:** John reports: - ACTS adult and juvenile detox/Wraparound/Sandra Prince/ICP all good. The Sandra Prince program director requested that meeting be held every rather than every other Tuesday and to add meetings on Thursday. The H&I rep for the group conducting those meetings said the meetings are now being held every Tuesday and will be held on Thursdays once more people volunteer. - - - Tampa General Behavioral Health has opened but no meetings going in yet. None of the original 10 volunteers want to go through the background investigation but 1 new volunteer said he would. John discussed concerns about the background investigation with the program director but no change was made. Tampa Hope is going well Cove Housing going well Salvation Army ARC meeting chair is moving and she found a replacement for the Tuesday meeting but a chair is still needed for the Sunday afternoon meeting Alberto reports: - Bay Care Northside Behavioral Health speaker meeting is going well. Speakers have been identified for the upcoming meetings. Gaby reports: - ACTS Nebraska men's residential is going well. Sobrenity group is taking in meetings every Tuesday at 7pm and turnout has been amazing with 20-25 attendees and 2 to 4 volunteers per meeting. A total of 15 people volunteered to support the meetings - Sobrenity group has been asked by Turning Point to take meetings into their detox on Sundays at 7pm. Volunteers are being solicited and so far 7 volunteers. No meeting start day yet. Ed reports: - River Oaks attendance is low due to the meeting no longer being mandatory. He said he will discuss that issue with facility staff this week. No reports: - Cove Behavioral Health or any other treatment facilities **Corrections:** Mindy reports: - Tim T. said meetings will be starting at the True Core boys facility. Hezekiah said he will be going with Tim to the first meeting there on May 17th. John mentioned that Tim said more volunteers are needed not only for that facility but also for a second facility Jessica reports: - True Core girls facility meetings have not started. She said more volunteers were needed before meetings are started. Nancy reports: - Women's meetings on Wednesday at Falkenburg Rd jail are going well. She said attendance is up with 13 and 17 attendees at the last two meetings. No

report from Bianca on the other meetings. Michael reports: - Men's meetings at Falkenburg Rd jail are going well. He said Buddy H. told him there were several volunteers in the process of being cleared. Michael added that a recent meeting he chaired had 19 attendees and 8 of those attendees were Spanish only speakers. He said he doesn't speak Spanish and it may be helpful to have a Spanish speaking volunteer. Mindy suggested contacting the Spanish language district to see if they have a corrections committee which could conduct Spanish language meetings. Jessica reports: - Women's meeting at Pasco county jail going well with 20 to 30 attendees per meetings. She said only one volunteer besides her and more volunteers are needed. Matt R. reports via e-mail: - Zephyrhills CI meeting attendance is trending upward. He added he recently brought in more literature and coffee for the meetings. **Bridging The Gap:** John reports he had four calls with three bridges. He added Mike B. had one call with one bridge. Jessica added that Tom F. had one call with one bridge. For the month that's six bridges from seven calls. 6/7 John added that Tracy S. is moving. She had been the program coordinator and received messages from unanswered calls. John said he has been maintaining the program contact list and Tom F. has been working with the Ring Central software. Around the tables, there is sometimes heard a lament or complaint about failures in Twelfth Step work, or lack of appreciation shown by some constant “slippers” in spite of all we are doing for them. Reviewing my own record, I realized how often I had been piqued because some newcomers didn’t thank me or appreciate my efforts sufficiently. (Of course, I had said, “As long as I am sober, it is successful Twelfth Step work.”) There came a time in my growth when I recognized my efforts and my expectations for what they truly were—defects of character, manifestations of selfishness and pride. When I saw them in that light, it meant I had to have God’s help to remove them and change the defects to virtues. Clearly, my actions had been right; it was the intentions behind them that had been wrong. So it was deep within me that the changes had to come. Now I realize that not only Twelfth Step work, but all other forms of A.A. service must be on a “no strings” basis. I must do them for the sake of doing them, to pass on what I have received, expecting nothing. As I have done this, I have found that my sobriety improves in quality and unexpected rewards pile up beyond description. In fact “no strings” approach works very well. **Anonymous**

SELF-SUPPORT-MAY 2025

© Today in May, 2025 we currently have 191 Groups in the Hillsborough-East Pasco area with around 498 meetings weekly. Also we have 128 Zoom meetings weekly. Contributions in May totaled \$5,299.38. This accounts for what 32 Groups or Individuals in our area have contributed in May, also included is, \$2,990.49 from 11 Groups or Individuals who made contributions through PayPal. We also received a \$290.00 from 4 Birthday Contributions. Our literature sales for May was \$3,976.63, along with \$7.00 for 1 newsletter subscription. This also includes sales from A.A material and non-A.A, material (medallions—etc.). Our total income for May was \$9,283.01 Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,218.24 Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our May income left us with a Gross Profit of \$6,064.77. Our Total Expenses for May were \$9,833.15. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus-\$3,768.38for the month of May. We are currently running \$2,475.07 in the red for the year. Last year was pretty ruff for us as far as contributions and literature sales. We netted about \$32,000.00 less from the previous year in contributions, about \$25,000.00 less in literature sales and couple that with rising expenses—electric, phone, rent, computer expenses—etc, it looked kind of bad. However, that is in the past and no need to dwell on it. We just need to keep moving forward. Currently, we still have a good Prudent Reserve, all our bills keep getting paid, the lights are on, we have a decent amount of literature available, the phones are working Thank you for your support .
