STEP NINE

Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

Many people will greet us openly as we are making our' amends. Some people will not remember our past wrongs when we discuss our reasons for making amends to them. Some people may hold deep resentments towards us and not be open to the amends we are trying to make. We will remain open to making amends to these types of people in the future if their feelings change. We can be satisfied that we completed the part of Step Nine that states: "Wherever possible." We can let go of any guilt and shame that we have when we experience this type of response to our amends, because we have done the best we could to resolve our past action towards them. It is always nice to receive a positive response when we are making our' amends. However, it may be more difficult to make amends to people who are still angry with us. We present our amends to them just as we have presented our amends to others on our list. Remember, we cannot control the responses others may have towards us. Once we have completed our amends, no matter what reaction the other person had towards us. We can walk away from our amends knowing we have done everything humanly possible to repair the damage we have caused them. It might take longer for our families and other people who were close to us to believe we are sincere. It will help to remember that we contributed to the attitudes that others have towards us. Amends of these types will often be completed over a longer period of time. They may begin to trust us after they have witnessed the positive result of our recoveries. It is not abnormal for them to hold anger against us, that they may eventually express once we have become sober. They may have been suffering their anger for their fear of expressing it, because it may have accelerated our drinking in the past. We can note that the Spiritual Promises are in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous on pages 83 & 84, at the end of the Ninth Step. We experience these spiritual promises to a large degree, as a direct result of competing our amends. We will have experienced much spiritual growth by the time we have completed Step Nine. We will experience being reconnected to society, no longer needing to avoid others because of our shame and guilt. We will be able to look others directly in the eye without the thoughts or beliefs that we are less than them. It is very possible that we will experience a spiritual awakening after completing Step Nine. We may come to know peace, freedom, and joy in a way that we have never known before.

In Memory of...Lest we Forget

Sandy B. ...September 9th, 1931 —September 28th, 2014

Sandy B. 83, of Tampa, FL passed away peacefully on Sunday, September 28, 2014 in an AA meeting while reading from Step 1 in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions. On December 7, 1964 (Pearl Harbor Day) Sandy stopped drinking and began a deep and lasting belief in the spiritual power of AA. In Alcoholics Anonymous, everybody knows everybody on first-name basis. People in AA keep a low public profile, lest a fall from sobriety reflect badly on the program. Popularity, however, has created exceptions to the rule. Most people know the last names of AA co-founders Bill W. and "Dr. Bob" - Wilson and Smith. On the speaking circuit, from small meetings to big conventions, certain names carry enough cachet that their anonymity fades away. And audiences play recordings of their talks the way others listen to a favorite album. Mostly they knew his messages about developing a spiritual life beyond abstinence, about letting go of control and tapping into what he called "the magic" they had once sought through alcohol. They knew his self-deprecating humor, which made the often-tough rhetoric easier to swallow. He believed emphatically in AA's 12 steps, especially the first one about admitting powerlessness over alcohol. "The point of the first step, quite frankly, is to convince you that your situation is a lot worse than you think it is," he said in 1994 talk. Consequently, it is the only step "you have to take 100 percent." " 'Almost' doesn't cut it. Almost getting sober is very much like almost having a parachute after the plane gets blown up and you're up in the air." Sandy compared his lifestyle with trying to swim while carrying a heavy rock. His "Drop the Rock" talk, still famous in AA circles, launched a parallel unpaid career as a sought-after speaker. "He could take the most complex thoughts you could come up with and distill it in simple terms," Sandy sponsored other men in AA who relied on him for steady guidance. "There were times when the Marine came out, the salty language," said Dick C., a 63-year-old developer who was mentored by Sandy. "He'd say, 'What part of the blankety-blank do you not blankety-blank understand' "Then he'd sit back and smile. He wasn't mad. He was just getting your attention. "Another AA member, Randy M., drove Sandy to a 7.30 p.m. meeting Sunday at Palma Ceia Presbyterian Church. Sandy had started the step study and speaker meeting a decade or so ago. As the meeting stated, Randy, fetched Sandy a cup of black coffee. Group members read AA's Preamble, which spells out the program's mission and its steps, then took turns reading from the 12 & 12."I asked him if he was okay," Randy said. "He looked at me and said, "Thanks for bringing me to the meeting, buddy." Moments later, Randy said, he heard a slight gasp from Sandy, whose head had slumped over on to the table. A member who is also a nurse rushed over to check his pulse. Another member, a physician, checked the carotid artery. Sandy was declared dead at the scene. His friends couldn't help but notice that he had died with his head on page 23 of the 12 & 12, from which the group had been reading. The passage covers the first step. (Editor's remark: Sandy was and still is an inspiration that the AA way of life is the only way of life for this old drunk, God Bless You and God Bless AA.)

Chair Report - The meeting started at 9:30 AM with the Declaration of Unity. He also said he would attend a Founders Day event at the 3333 Club being put on by FCYPAA on June 8 between the hours of 12 to 4 PM.

Secretary Report - Tom F then read the secretary report and it was accepted as read without any changes to it. **Treasurer Report** – John T's. presented the Treasurer's Report. Our current balance is \$4,992.01. Monthly expenses were \$50.00 for Central Office Storage, \$25.80 uncashed check to Sara R. which reduced the monthly expense to \$24.20. Literature expenses for the month totaled \$2,920.77. Our committee received \$509.80 in contributions from the following groups: Grapevine Gals; Keep It Simple Pass It On; Language of the Heart and Ruskin Fellowship (Sunday). **Treatment** – All meetings at ACTS Detox are being covered except for the Friday noon meeting needs some help as the person currently covering cannot do it every week. All meetings at ACTS Amethyst are currently being covered except Wednesday at 1:00 PM. Cove Housing for Women seems to have closed their doors to us and we are not sure why that happened. The men's meetings at Cove Behavioral Health are going well according to Joe R.. Sandra Prince is also doing well according to Joe R.. **Corrections** – True Core Juvenile, had a girl commit suicide and the state has taken the facility offline. She asked about getting the literature back from the facility. She was told to get any literature back that she could. Hillsborough County Jail for women Bianca reported that a couple of volunteers were rotating out for personal reasons, but she has 4 new volunteers in the process of getting cleared for the Hillsborough County Jail. No report for the men's side of Hillsborough Jail. Things are going well at Zephyrhills CI according to Tom F. Jessica reported that they are having issues covering meetings at the Pasco County Jail for women. She also expressed some interest in possibly replacing Brittani as the coordinator for that facility. **Bridge The Gap** – Bridge the Gap we two Bridges. Man on the Bed – Tom F. reported that he had one call for a male patient but the person who was supposed to cover it simply forgot to do it. **Old Business** – No old business **New Business** – Bay Care North wants us to take a meeting into a new facility with patients who were Baker Acted. We need to know what time and days they would like us to be there. Jonathan said he would find out. The meeting ended at 10:30 AM

The Corrections Committee needs all types of volunteers. They need people to attend meetings in the facilities, people to help spread the word about this type of service work. It is okay if you have never been to jail yourself! You can still help. You can still carry A.A.'s message of hope to an alcoholic who is incarcerated.

Tradition Nine August 1948

The least possible organization, that's our universal ideal. No fees, no dues, no rules imposed on anybody, one alcoholic bringing recovery to the next; that's the substance of what we most desire, isn't it? But how shall this simple ideal best be realized? Often a question, that. We have, for example, the kind of AA who is for simplicity. Terrified of anything organized, he tells us that AA is getting too complicated. He thinks money only makes trouble, committees only make dissension, elections only make politics, paid workers only make professionals, and clubs only coddle slippers. Says he, let's get back to coffee and cakes by cozy firesides. If any alcoholics stray our way, let's look after them. But that's enough. Simplicity is our answer. Quite opposed to such halcyon simplicity is the AA promoter. Left to himself, he would "bang the cannon and twang the lyre" at every crossroad of the world. Millions for drunks, great AA hospitals, batteries of paid organizers, and publicity experts wielding all the latest paraphernalia of sound and script; such would be our promoter's dream. "Yes, sir," he would bark. "My two-year plan calls for one million AA members by 1950!" For one, I'm glad we have both conservatives and enthusiasts. They teach us much. The conservative will surely see to it that the AA movement never gets overly organized. But the promoter will continue to remind us of our terrific obligation to the newcomer and to those hundreds of thousands of alcoholics still waiting all over the world to hear of AA. We shall, naturally, take the firm and safe middle course. AA has always violently resisted the idea of any general organization. Yet, paradoxically, we have ever stoutly insisted upon organizing certain special services; mostly those absolutely necessary to effective and plentiful Twelfth Step work. If, for instance, an AA group elects a secretary or rotating committee, if an area forms an intergroup committee, if we set up a foundation, a general office or a Grapevine, then we are organized for service. The AA book and pamphlets, our meeting places and clubs, our dinners and regional assemblies—these are services, too. Nor can we secure good hospital connections, properly sponsor new prospects, and obtain good public relations just by chance. People have to be appointed to look after these things, sometimes paid people. Special services are performed. But by none of these special services has our spiritual or social activity, the great current of AA, ever been really organized or professionalized. Yet our recovery program has been enormously aided. While important, these service activities are very small by contrast with our main effort. As such facts and distinctions become clear, we shall easily lay aside our fears of blighting organization or hazardous wealth. As a movement, we shall remain comfortably poor, for our service expenses are trifling. With such assurances, we shall without doubt continue to improve and extend our vital lifelines of special service; to better carry our AA message to others; to make for ourselves a finer, greater Society, and, God willing, to assure Alcoholics Anonymous a long life and perfect unity.

SELF-SUPPORT- August, 2024

© Today in August, 2024 COVID has changed the way many groups contribute to the Central Office. Some groups have remained steady in their contributions, some groups have gone to ZOOM, A few ZOOM groups have made some contributions and some groups are Hybrid (in-person & ZOOM), other groups have folded for a lack of a space to have their meeting and some new groups are starting up, and now many groups are getting back to normal pre-pandemic live meetings. Things are looking up and getting better. It's certainly a time to renew our efforts and practice the meaning of the Serenity Prayer a little bit more. We currently have 191 Groups in the Hillsborough-East Pasco area with around 502 meetings weekly. Also we have 128 Zoom meetings weekly. Contributions in August totaled \$7,160.56. This accounts for what 25 Groups or Individuals in our area have contributed in August, also included is, \$3,762.79 from 10 Groups or Individuals who made contributions through PayPal, include in that was \$2500.00 in Loving Memory for Greg O. who recently passed away with 32 years of sobriety and \$213.00 from 2 members of the Birthday Club. Our literature sales for August was \$7,494.81. This includes sales from A.A. material and non-A.A. material (medallions—etc.). Our total income for August was \$14,655.37. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,168.12. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our August income left us with a Gross Profit of \$11,487.25. Our Total Expenses for August were \$9,609.46. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus+\$1,877.77 for the month of August. August was really another poor month, although we were in the black, sinking us further into the red for the year. We still have a good Prudent Reserve, all our bills keep getting paid, the lights are on, we have a decent amount of literature available, the phones are working Thank you for your support . Thank You!!!O.M. tws:)

With humility?
