Traditional AA in the Traditional Way

The first two AA members I met had both been around the Fellowship for about nine years. One had nine years of continuous sobriety and a manageable life-style for all that time. The other had never achieved a single year's sobriety, and his life-style had been unmanageable, by his own definition, throughout those nine years. The one I chose as my sponsor was the one who had achieved the better results. He had three AA books: *Alcoholics Anonymous*, the "Twelve and Twelve," and *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age*. The other had these books plus the biggest library on the subject of alcoholism that I have ever seen anyway in my past eleven years as a member in good standing of the AA Fellowship. In these years of my sobriety, I have not found it necessary to own books on alcoholism other than the three on the AA program. Yet I have recovered from all of the illnesses that were alcohol-induced and have had a manageable life through-out the rest of my professional career and since my retirement three years ago. In addition to my regular duties in my own profession as a systems manager, I served as deputy director of the U.S. Postal Service Corporation's Program for Alcoholics' Recovery in the Federal Service, which has developed into one of the largest and most successful programs of it's kind anywhere in the world. During all of these years, I attended AA meetings only in the traditional places (rather than in the hospital type of environment), as did practically all of the postal employees processed through the PAR system. Recently, I was asked to attend meetings of an AA group organized by an AA group by an AA member who was serving as a counselor in the alcoholism ward of a general hospital. I was glad to go there, instead of to the regular AA meeting that I was accustomed to attending on that night of the week, because I thought I might be able to make a contribution by sharing my hopes, strength and experience with the still-suffering alcoholic. In doing so, I shared my faith in the AA program of recovery and the AA Traditions, as set forth in the three books I have mentioned and in the light of my own experience. As time went by, it became apparent that this approach to sobriety was resented by the fellow AA who served as counselor. Not wanting to disturb the unity of the group, I came to believe that it would be best for everyone concerned if I withdrew from the group and returned to my AA meetings held in more traditional surroundings. I have done so. It I don't know whether this action has been beneficial to anyone else concerned, but I do know that it has been beneficial to me and my peace of mind. It has reinforced my faith in the AA way of life, to which I owe my recovery and my very sanity and life.

Half Measures of Honesty?

I have been a member of Alcoholics Anonymous for several years, and I'm most grateful. The rewards and benefits I have received have all been made possible through accepting and following certain conditions set forth in the program of AA. Which of these conditions is of the greatest importance may be debatable. However, I doubt that any of them are more important than honesty. I have heard honesty discussed many times over the past several years, and I hope it will continue to be discussed even more frequently and with greater emphasis. How honest am I? Whenever I have asked myself this question, the answer has always been elusive and unclear. I wonder how many others have tried to answer it without success. I have come to believe there really isn't a definite answer, and the reason is the question itself. It clearly indicates there is some degree of dishonesty lurking in the background. It suggests half measures: some honesty, some dishonesty. In the Big Book, I have found such phrases as "rigorous honesty," "honest desire to stop drinking," "the capacity to be honest," "fearless and thorough," and many others. If I *have* to ask how honest I am, then I'm practicing half measures. The Big Book clearly states, "Half measures availed us nothing." Either I'm honest or I'm not. Is there any in-between? *How honest do I have to be?* This is a topic frequently discussed at meetings. I have found some of the comments to be most interesting and intriguing. Some of those heard most often are: "This doesn't mean cash-register honesty"; "You can't be completely honest and get along out there in that world." Do they sound familiar? The discussions run from mild to heated. At one meeting, the leader summarized with a statement something like this: "Based on what I've heard, it is the consensus of this group that it is all right to tell little white lies." Needless to say, the meeting didn't end at that point. These discussions have been and I'm sure, will continue to be good for me. The net result is that I go back to the Big Book and read it again and again. Any ideas I may ever have possessed about "allowable" degrees of honesty (or should I say dishonesty?) have long since been dispelled. I haven't been able to find any place in the Big Book that allows for anything less than honesty. *How important is honesty?* The word appears throughout the Big Book. Sometimes, an adjective is used with it, such as "rigorous." It must be rather important, or it wouldn't appear so often nor would such emphasis be placed on it. There are many passages in the Big Book that imply the necessity for honesty, even though the word doesn't appear in them. Early in my AA life, an older member and I were discussing a mutual friend, who had gone back to drinking after several years in AA. I asked the question "Why?" The older member's reply was: "He wasn't honest." Since that time, I have come to believe that the difference between *honesty* and *dishonesty* is *sobriety*. Honesty applies to all our affairs, and this means both inside and outside Alcoholics Anonymous—not one of the other, but both. This covers all moral, material, and spiritual aspects of our lives. It means we are to give up those old ideas and walk like we talk. There just isn't any in-between.

Prison AA: Three Years Sober and Free

I have been reading the Grapevine for four years and enjoying every article I've read, so I feel it's about time I sent in my comments and appreciation. My first communication with AA was in an institution in Florida in 1965, at the age of twenty. At the time, I hadn't hit bottom, and I wasn't willing to go to any length for a different way of life. Within an hour after release, I was intoxicated and shoplifting. The freedom was short-lived. In twenty-one days I was sentenced to six months for car theft in San Jose, Calif. This alone should have given me some sign. This insane living was halted in January 1969 by a very compassionate judge, who sent me to a California medical institution for treatment. He said that I was not a menace to society, but a menace to myself, and that I needed help. I entered the AA program in May 1969, hopeless, frightened, angry, and—to my knowledge—without a friend in the world, completely alone. As the Big Book mentions, I went at the Twelve Steps like a drowning man. To add to my desperation, I was doing six months to fifteen years this time. I was in a hurry to find an answer. I'll shorten the novel I could write about the wonderful program and the things that have come to pass, by just saying this: I was released in nineteen months and have been in the streets ever since, three years sober. That's the longest I've been sober since the age of fourteen and the longest I've been free since the age of sixteen. The compulsion both to drink and to steal has been lifted, by the Grace of God, as the bog Book promised. If this is printed, may it serve as a Twelfth Step call to those in institutions. My friends, if it will work for me, it will work for anybody.

SELF-SUPPORT - JANUARY, 2026

© Today in January we have gone down from **191** Groups to **184** groups and from **498** meetings weekly to **461**. Also we have **132** Zoom meetings weekly, up from **129**. Contributions in January totaled \$9,822.93. This accounts for what 76 Groups or Individuals in our area have contributed in January, also included is, \$1,,025.00 from 41 ticket sales for the upcoming Central Office Anniversary, and \$1,705.48 from Groups or Individuals who made contributions through PayPal. We also received a \$36.00 from 2 Birthday Contributions and \$16.00 from the Pancake Breakfast Event. Our literature sales for January was \$5,785.94. This also includes sales from A.A material and non-A,A, material (medallions—etc.) Our total income for January was \$15,608.87. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$4,073.08. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our January income left us with a Gross Profit of \$11,535.79. Our Total Expenses for January were \$8,882.07. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus+\$2,653.72 for the month of January. Currently, we still have a good Prudent Reserve, all our bills keep getting paid, the lights are on, we have a decent amount of literature available, the phones are working Thank you for your support . 


